Inspired by Pope Francis' emphasis on synodality and walking the path of Christ with all God's people, I take pride in our collective commitment to demonstrate that no one needs to traverse life's journey alone.

MESSAGE FROM THE EPISCOPAL VICAR OF SOCIAL WELFARE

Dear brothers and sisters!

The end of a year and the beginning of another is a time to stop and reflect on the historical moments we are living in. At the beginning of this year and as we present this annual review there is an urgent need to look around and contemplate under the eyes of faith which are the challenges that we have to face to continue to be messengers of hope to those around us.

As I write this short message, the words of Jesus resound in me "Peace, I leave you; my own peace I give to you. Not as the world gives do I give to you. Let not your hearts be troubled, neither let them be afraid" (John 14:27)

This peace is the first gift of the Risen Lord that he gives to his disciples. In biblical language, the concept of 'peace' refers to wholeness, total health, total welfare. Although bible scholars say that the world peace can be used in many ways, they agree that true peace implies a good relationship with God, with our neighbor and with ourselves.

Our mission as disciples is to create the bridges, the strategies and the atmosphere to create true peace in our world and in our society.

Amongst us, there are many who find it hard to experience this beautiful gift of peace due to many challenges like the high cost of living, the need to leave their countries due to poverty, persecution and war, the violence they experience in their daily lives, the worries of an uncertain future, the frustration of not being heard or understood due to their background and skin color and so on. There are many situations which attack and affect our inner peace daily.

In his message for the Word Day of Peace on the First of January 1968 Pope Paul VI, now a saint of the Church said that "Peace cannot be based on a false rhetoric of words which are welcomed because they answer to the deep, genuine aspirations of humanity, but which can also serve, and unfortunately have sometimes served, to hide the lack of true spirit and of real intentions for peace, if not indeed to mask sentiments and actions of oppression and party interests. Nor can one rightly speak of peace where no recognition or respect is given to its solid foundations: namely, sincerity, justice and love in the relations between states, and, within the limits of each nation, in the relations of citizens with each other and with their rulers: freedom of individuals and of peoples, in all its expressions, civic, cultural, moral, and religious; otherwise, it is not peace which will exist - even if, perchance, oppression is able to create the external appearance of order and legality but an unceasing and insuppressible growth of revolt and war." He continues saying that "Peace is not pacifism; it does not mask a base and slothful concept of life, but it proclaims the highest and most universal values of life: truth, justice, freedom, love."

Our efforts at Catholic Care are directed to be messengers and agents of peace in Western Sydney and the Blue Mountains, these efforts are hopefully reflected in this annual report, and to quote Saint Paul VI again "if you want peace, work for justice". This is the idea that thrives our efforts at Catholic Care Western Sydney and the Blue Mountains. May the Risen Lord continue to grant us the strength to work tirelessly for the peace that

2022 -2023 IN FOCUS

2022 – 2023 was another big year for Catholic Care Western Sydney and the Blue Mountains and the people we have the privilege to accompany as they traverse some of the most challenging moments in their lives.

As the world started to return to a 'post-covid' state, the need for care and assistance from the communities we serve did not waver. We continued to provide support across our five key programs: Aged Care, Family Support, Community Engagement, Chaplaincy, and Disability Services, and focused on maintaining and growing our government funding to provide for the increasing number of people who require our help.

We launched new programs – from tech help to sewing classes and women's circles – that saw our connections to the community grow. Our people embrace journeying together with our clients, so we can make progress together. We see that in the breadth of services that make a real impact on people's lives:

- Providing rental properties with furniture and essential items to homeless single mothers
- Employing people with a disability unable to find work
- Supporting people on temporary visas
- Providing groceries to hundreds of people through our drop-in centres at Emerton and Mamre House
- Alleviating loneliness in the elderly through regular visits to their homes
- Listening with the ear of the heart to people in prison and hospital
- Sitting down to have a cuppa and chat with people who just need human connection
- Counselling services for people suffering through grief, addiction, or troubling times
- Family day care services and more.

OUR HISTORY

Catholic Care traces its roots back to the 1940s when it was conceived by four visionary Sydney women. Their aspiration was to ensure that the impoverished and those in distress could access professional care provided by the Catholic Church.

Taking their idea to then-Archbishop of Sydney, Cardinal Gilroy, they proposed the establishment of a Catholic welfare organisation. Thus, the Catholic Welfare Bureau was inaugurated. With the creation of the Diocese of Parramatta in 1986, the welfare arm evolved into Centrecare Parramatta, undergoing a subsequent name change to Catholic Care Western Sydney and the Blue Mountains in 2017.

In the present day, Catholic Care Western Sydney and the Blue Mountains impacts thousands in the community annually. This is made possible by the dedicated efforts of over 100 staff and volunteers committed to the organisation's mission.

HOW WE **SUPPORT?**

AGED CARE

Whatever your age, you will never be invisible to the people at Catholic Care. Our range of support aims to keep you living independently in your own home for as long as possible, while staying connected with your friends and community.

CHAPLAINCY

Providing spiritual and emotional support, our chaplains work with patients and inmates, their families and staff in the seven hospitals and three correctional centres throughout the Diocese of Parramatta.

FAMILY SUPPORT

No matter what issue your family might be facing, Catholic Care is there to help. From helping young pregnant women navigate their pregnancy to family day cares to get a good start to every child's education to counselling services, parenting education workshops and more.

COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT

Our drop-in centres provide a safe place for people to belong and connect with others. They are a place to go, a place to be, a place to get information, join a group and be connected.

DISABILITY SERVICES

Our disability support team help people facing living, learning and other obstacles. We help people set goals and achieve them, and build a brighter future.





AGED CARE

As our population continues to age, Catholic Care will be here to support more people to live independently in their own home as long as possible. We also aim to enrich lives by helping to reduce loneliness and keep people connected.

Our Commonwealth Home Support Program assists older people at home through meal preparation and shopping assistance to home maintenance and respite for carers.

Our Community Visitors Scheme aims to reduce loneliness through fortnightly visit to residents at aged-care facilities.

CHAPLAINCY

In the six hospitals and four correctional centers across the Diocese of Parramatta, our chaplains have played a vital role in providing spiritual and emotional support. This inclusive ministry, catering to individuals of all faiths, involved a team of 15 dedicated chaplains who worked collaboratively with patients, inmates, their families, and the staff.

Our chaplains seamlessly integrate into the broader care network, ensuring a holistic approach to wellbeing for those under their compassionate guidance.

Fr Dado's Story

One of our hospital chaplains, Fr Dado says God leads him to wherever he is needed in the hospital.

"In my ministry, I am open to any possibility, because along the way I might meet staff who want to talk or share. I may receive a call from a social worker asking me to bless a baby who is stillborn. I may get a call from one of the parishes to visit a parishioner who is in hospital."

He says no two days, or two patient visits, are the same.

"Sometimes people just want to share how they feel or just say hello. It could sometimes be a sacramental visit – a request for anointing or hearing confession. At times, a hospital stay could also be a point of conversion.

"Whenever you are sick in hospital, you have plenty of time on your hands and sometimes people reflect on life or their own spirituality, or their being Catholic. Sometimes I meet people who haven't been to Church in a long time. It's totally different – there is no visit that is the same."

FAMILY SUPPORT

Catholic Care's comprehensive family services have provided vital support to thousands of families facing diverse challenges. From providing affordable Family Day Care to helping women and children flee domestic violence situations, our programs offer stability and help foster new connections within their community.

Our pivotal Houses 2 Homes programs helped numerous pregnant girls or young parents aged 16 – 25 years escape homelessness and find a new life.

Simultaneously, our parenting support program has offered guidance and assistance to new parents navigating the overwhelming challenges of caring for a newborn, ensuring they receive essential support during this significant life transition.

At our creche, a thriving early learning centre, children of Sudanese refugee women engaged in English classes on Catholic Care's grounds have received dedicated care and educational support. Our HIPPY program for parents of four-yearolds from Aboriginal and non-English speaking backgrounds is a way to give children the best start to school possible.

Our counselling services were heavily used. From family and financial counselling to gambling and grief counselling. We also provided the following group activities:

COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT

Catholic Care's drop-in centres have provided a welcoming refuge for individuals seeking connection and a sense of belonging. These centers serve as inclusive spaces, offering not just a physical location, but also a place where individuals feel accepted and can engage with others authentically.

In Emerton, the Aboriginal Catholic Care community centre has offered cultural support, literacy classes, information, and a vibrant cultural art group. Meanwhile, All Saints of Africa in Blacktown has supported culturally and linguistically diverse families in their settlement journey in Australia.

Our Springwood drop-in centre has created a friendly environment where clients can engage in conversations, join reading or wellbeing groups, improve their technological skills, or seek support for mental health concerns. Additionally, our newest addition, Mamre House and Farm, has provided diverse opportunities such as English classes, computer courses, seniors' day clubs, craft clubs, and the simple pleasure of enjoying a cup of tea amidst the tranquil farm surroundings.
